SUBJECT: ORDINANCE – First Reading for adoption of Moratorium on Adult Arcade Amusement Facilities

Issue Background:

Many municipalities throughout the State of Florida have enacted moratoria on the issuance of development permits, business tax receipts or other approvals for adult arcade amusement facilities. These facilities, which are identified as adult arcades, game rooms, internet cafes or sweepstakes redemption centers, use slot machines, simulated gambling devices or similar equipment and are proliferating throughout the entire state. Currently, the most popular type of facility is the internet café.

While these establishments may sell internet time or phone cards, the simulated gambling brings the customers through the door. Upon purchase of internet time or phone cards, the establishment loads sweepstakes or entries onto a card or account. The customers then use on-site computers or slot-like cabinets that have the appearance of video gaming machines to see whether they have won a cash prize.

These businesses have taken advantage of a gray area in the law which raises doubt as to whether the activity can be criminally prosecuted as illegal gambling. The operators of the businesses claim that the games are promotions pursuant to Section 849.094, Florida Statutes or charitable drawings under Section 849.0935, Florida Statutes. Neither statute explicitly authorizes or prohibits conducting promotions or drawings through the use of electronic devices. These types of games are not actively overseen by any state agency, and to date, no Florida appellate court has examined their legality. Seminole County enacted an ordinance banning all simulated gambling devices, which is currently being challenged in the court system.

Two bills were introduced during the most recent session of the Florida Legislature to prohibit the use of simulated gambling devices in connection with a game promotion, sweepstakes, drawing, raffle or any game of chance. See HB 217 (“Simulated Gambling Prohibition and Community Protection Act”) and SB 576 (“Electronic Machines and Devices for Sweepstakes Prohibited Act”). Both bills died in committee.

Your Village Attorney has drafted an Ordinance enacting a one-year moratorium on adult arcade amusement facilities, thereby allowing Village Staff a opportunity to analyze the impacts of this use within the Village, evaluate the appropriate locations (if any) for this use, and determine whether the Village should incorporate special standards for these facilities into its zoning regulations. The moratorium ordinance was reviewed by the Planning Commission at its public hearing on July 5, 2011. The Planning Commission unanimously recommended approval of the ordinance "with the condition for a period of one year or earlier until such time as the Village adopts regulations."

Recommendation:

Village Administration recommends that the Council move to enact a zoning in progress for adult arcade amusement facilities pending consideration of an ordinance adopting a moratorium on the acceptance of any application or request for approval of such an establishment.

1 Section 2. For the purpose of this Ordinance, an adult arcade amusement facility is any
2 facility, whether identified as an arcade, game room, internet café or sweepstakes redemption
3 center, that utilizes slot machines, simulated gambling devices or similar equipment. A
4 simulated gambling device means any device that, upon connection with an object (coin, bill,
5 ticket, token card or similar object), is available to play or operate a computer simulation of any
6 game, and which may deliver or entitle the person or persons playing or operating the device to a
7 payoff, including money, credit, tickets or tokens to be exchanged for cash or to receive
8 merchandise or any other thing of value. **This Ordinance shall only apply to establishments
9 marketed to adults and shall not apply to traditional game rooms or arcades generally targeted to
10 minors that do not utilize slot machines, simulated gambling devices or similar equipment.**
11

12 Section 3. Effective as of June 23, 2011, the date the Village Council adopted a Zoning in
13 Progress, the Village Council hereby imposes a moratorium upon the acceptance of applications
14 for and the issuance of any development permits, business tax receipts or other approvals for
15 adult arcade amusement facilities. The Village Council directs Village Staff to study and
16 analyze the impacts of such facilities and evaluate the appropriate locations (if any) for such uses
17 within the Village and determine whether the Village should incorporate special standards for
18 such facilities into its zoning regulations.
19

20 Section 3. The moratorium shall remain in effect for a period of one year from the effective
21 date of this Ordinance or until the effective date of an ordinance amending the zoning regulations
22 to address adult arcade amusement facilities, whichever first occurs.
23

24 Section 4. All ordinances and resolutions, or parts of ordinances and resolutions, in conflict
25 herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.
26

27 Section 5. If any section, paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase or word of this Ordinances is
28 for any reason held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional, inoperative or
29 void, such holding shall not affect the remainder of the Ordinance.
30

31 Section 6. This Ordinance shall become effective immediately upon adoption.

Legislature must act on Internet cafes

Florida lawmakers need to be concerned when a so-called "gray area" of state law shelters what may be a billion-dollar industry built on the appeal of games that resemble casino-style gambling.

In recent years, Internet sweepstakes cafes have sprung up like weeds in strip malls all over the state. By some estimates, there are more than 500 of these businesses now operating in Florida. They've popped up in Volusia and Flagler counties, forcing local officials to debate whether the establishments provide legitimate entertainment or illegal gambling for their customers. Depending on court rulings and decisions by city and county officials, many more Internet cafes could open in Florida in the next year.

Critics call the cafes "strip mall casinos" or "convenience casinos." Owners of the cafes and lobbyists representing this increasingly powerful industry say they offer legal sweepstakes games - not gambling.

A 2007 advisory opinion from former Attorney General Bill McCollum helped create the legal "gray area" where Internet cafes operate. McCollum noted that under Florida law, gambling activities "cannot be disguised as a 'game promotion.'" However, he left it to local law enforcement agencies to decide, on a case-by-case basis, whether Internet cafes promote legal sweepstakes games or illegal games of chance.

The Internet parlors sell Internet time or phone cards that provide patrons with credits to play "sweepstakes" games. A News-Journal reporter who recently visited an Internet cafe in Palm Coast discovered that he could win up to \$13,000 playing a game featuring spinning symbols similar to those found on slot machines.

Despite the proliferation of the cafes and the hodgepodge of local laws adopted in response to them, the Legislature has done nothing to clarify state law on what constitutes gambling. A bill sponsored in the last session by Rep. Scott Plakon, R-Longwood, would have banned the use of simulated gambling for promotional purposes. But the bill went nowhere, and some lawmakers said they wanted to regulate -- not ban -- Internet sweepstakes games.

In the absence of state regulation or a state ban, many communities are struggling with how to deal with games that compulsive gambling experts believe are adding to the ranks of addicted and problem gamblers.

Officials in Volusia and Flagler counties are taking approaches ranging from regulating the location of Internet cafes (Orange City and Volusia County), enacting moratoriums on them (Deltona and Port Orange) or outright banning them (Daytona Beach Shores and Ponce Inlet). The Palm Coast City Council is considering whether to adopt a six-month moratorium on the parlors.

Not surprisingly, the courts have been asked to clear up the confusion surrounding the legality of Internet cafes. According to a story in The Tampa Tribune, the courts generally have ruled that the games are operating legally as a sweepstakes. But there has been no definitive interpretation of state law in this area, leaving local governments to fill the legislative vacuum.

Representatives of the Internet cafe industry say the games are similar to the Monopoly prize cards offered by McDonald's restaurants. But others see a darker side to the Internet games: crime, gambling addiction and poverty.

Officials with the Florida Council on Compulsive Gambling say they've received dozens of calls to their help line from people seeking help for problems related to the sweepstakes centers. The problems are the same as those encountered by people "when they frequent any other gambling establishment," Brian Kongsvik, the council's help-line director, said. "They are having problems paying household bills, some are using savings or retirement. More than a third of them are committing illegal acts to finance their gambling."

Whether you call it gambling or sweepstakes-type games, it's a major industry in Florida. The New York Times, citing estimates from "industry analysts, state legislators and their aides, and lawyers in the gambling industry," said Internet cafes in Florida will gross more than \$1 billion this year.

This number is a very big red flag. If a billion dollars a year is being pumped into the Internet games, the Legislature urgently needs to take action. Lawmakers should either regulate the games or declare them a socially destructive form of gambling and ban them. It's totally irresponsible for the Legislature to stand by and do nothing while Floridians are pouring their money into unregulated games that look a lot like what one would find in a casino.

As we see it, Florida has enough gambling: pari-mutuel betting at dog tracks and horse tracks, poker rooms, the state lottery and tribal casinos. The state doesn't need more gambling, and it certainly doesn't need a billion-dollar gray area in gambling law.

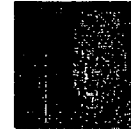

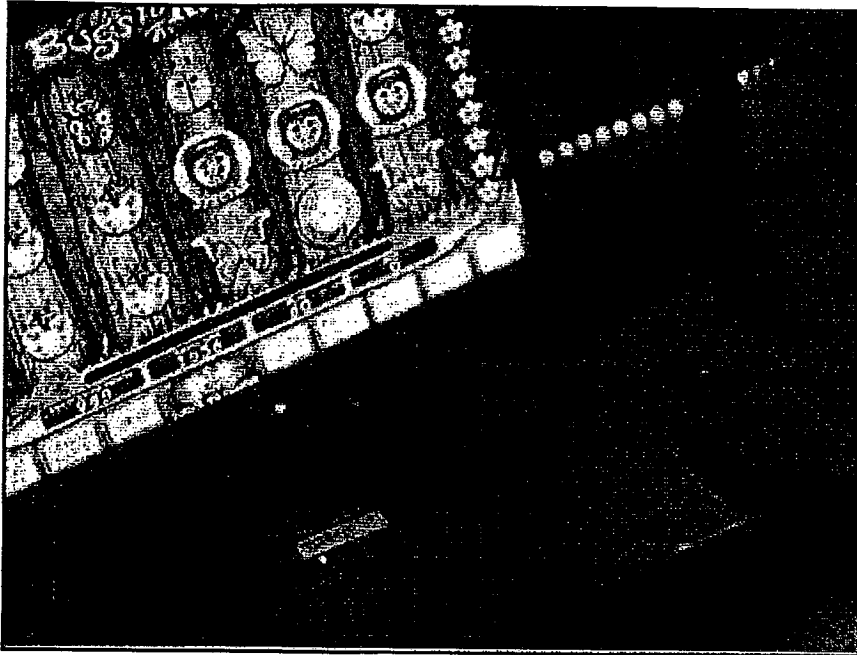

Critics Label Florida's Internet Cafes as Magnets for Crime

APOPKA | A drab strip mall in this Orlando suburb includes the usual fixtures: a pharmacy and a payday loans store, as well as an Internet cafe with a sign on the door that reads "Copy-Fax-Print, Surf the Web."

That these cafes are cash machines — and take in as much as \$100,000 a week — is no secret to robbers.

And so, at 1 a.m. on April 19, three armed men tried to rob the place at a time when more than three dozen people were playing slot machine-type games on the cafe's computer terminals. A security guard shot and killed one of the men; the other two fled and were being sought. A woman hiding in the bathroom told a 911 operator that the robbery was happening in "the casino, in Apopka."

The shooting death in a place that some customers call a casino has brought fresh scrutiny to Florida's quickly multiplying "Internet sweepstakes cafes," which now total nearly 1,000 statewide and are estimated to gross more than \$1 billion this year, according to industry analysts, state legislators and their aides and lawyers in the gambling industry.

It has also renewed calls by several county sheriffs for a statewide ban on the cafes' games. They say the businesses are magnets for crime because they usually have large sums of cash on hand. Since nine sweepstakes cafes have opened in Seminole County, crimes at those addresses have increased 14 percent, according to data compiled by the sheriff's office.

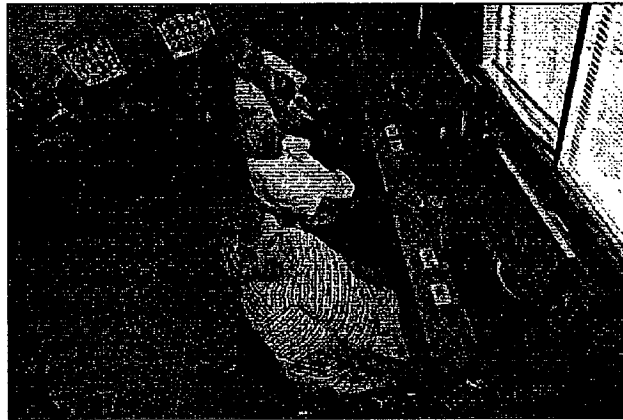

Popular Internet sweepstakes rooms flourish in a legal 'gray zone'

TAMPA

Stephanie Clark sits in a dark strip mall at a computer screen with five reels spinning leprechauns and penguins. The reels stop and her computer dings — a \$24 prize. Her husband sits across from her, having no such luck. They are here often, in a dim room with 50 computers and a handful of people they know by name. At Calypso Sun Cyber Cafe on State Road 60 in Valrico, Clark and other customers spin Vegas-style slots with a click of a mouse, and pick numbers on a screen lotto-style. Are they gambling?

Internet sweepstakes store owners say no. Customers buy Internet time — \$6 an hour at Calypso — bundled with casino-style sweepstakes. Critics say the social costs such as addiction and crime play out like gambling, but without the benefits of fees or taxes because the cafes are largely unregulated.

It's also big business. A small storefront cafe can pull in more than \$20,000 a week. One gaming industry attorney estimates that, statewide, the cafes rake in as much money as Tampa's Hard Rock casino.

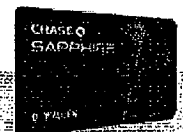

There has yet to be a Florida case finding that sweepstakes cafes are illegal, said Kelly Mathis, a Jacksonville attorney who represents Allied Veterans. But some sites have been raided by sheriffs, including an Allied Veterans cafe in Pinellas County about four years ago. Rather than take the matter to court, Allied Veterans moved elsewhere, Mathis said.

Law enforcement agencies have different strategies for dealing with cafes. In the Tampa Bay area, authorities have shut down several and seized equipment in recent years. In late 2010, the Pinellas Sheriff's Office sent letters warning cafe owners to shut down in 30 days or face a gambling investigation. The Polk County sheriff consistently roots them out, a spokesman said. Yet Tampa police allowed two cafes to open recently.

Some authorities say they're waiting for the Legislature to clarify sweepstakes laws.

Attorney General Pam Bondi supports such legislation after seeing the cafes proliferate in Hillsborough County. As a prosecutor in Tampa, she tried to go after one.

"We just didn't have the tools to do it," she said.

• • •

Florida is the fourth-largest gambling state in the nation and would be third if sweepstakes cafes were included, said Marc Dunbar, a Tallahassee attorney who represents casinos, pari-mutuels and gaming suppliers. He estimates that the sweepstakes cafes' statewide take likely equals that of Florida's largest grossing gambling venue, Tampa's Hard Rock casino.

And while Florida reaps billions from the lottery, state-sanctioned slot machines and pari-mutuels, it gets very little from sweepstakes cafes. Dunbar, who doesn't represent cafe owners, believes they are illegal under state gambling laws. The businesses, he noted, operate primarily with cash and virtually no accountability to a state agency.

Legalities aside, some say the cafes come with the same social costs as gambling, including crime and addiction. Several cafes around the state have been robbed in the past year, including a heist of several thousand dollars in Orange City.

• • •

The Florida Council on Compulsive Gambling started getting calls from people seeking help with sweepstakes-related problems in 2009. It logged 115 sweepstakes players among the hotline's 2,700 callers in an 18-month period.

The results were disturbing, said Brian Kongsvik, who compiled the data. Sweepstakes customers, the council found, were typically older, less affluent women. Twenty-nine percent were unemployed or disabled, and 80 percent admitted having problems paying bills.

About 40 percent said they had committed crimes to pay for the games, including larceny, embezzlement, dealing drugs and prostitution.

For sweepstakes players, the effect is the same as sitting in front of a slot machine, said the council's director Pat Fowler: "They say they have a gambling problem."

Current legislation

Bills that would ban sweepstakes rooms in Florida have "no chance" of passing this year, said state Sen. Nancy Detert, chairwoman of the Committee on Commerce and Tourism. State Rep. Scott Plakon, R-Longwood, sponsored a similar House bill to ban the cafes, and said he will file another next year.

Detert, R-Venice, plans to take on sweepstakes laws next year but prefers to regulate rather than ban them because she said older people in her district like the games. "This is the new bingo," she said.

Drafting a bill to regulate the cafes will be complex, she said, because regulating them could jeopardize the \$400 million exclusive gaming compact that the state has with the Seminole Indian Tribe.

A Senate bill currently working its way to the budget committee would add no new regulations to sweepstakes cafes, but would move oversight for games with prizes of more than \$5,000 from the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services to the Department of Gaming Control.

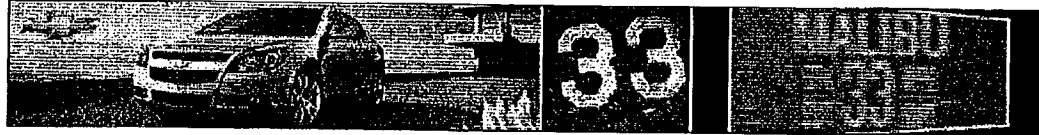

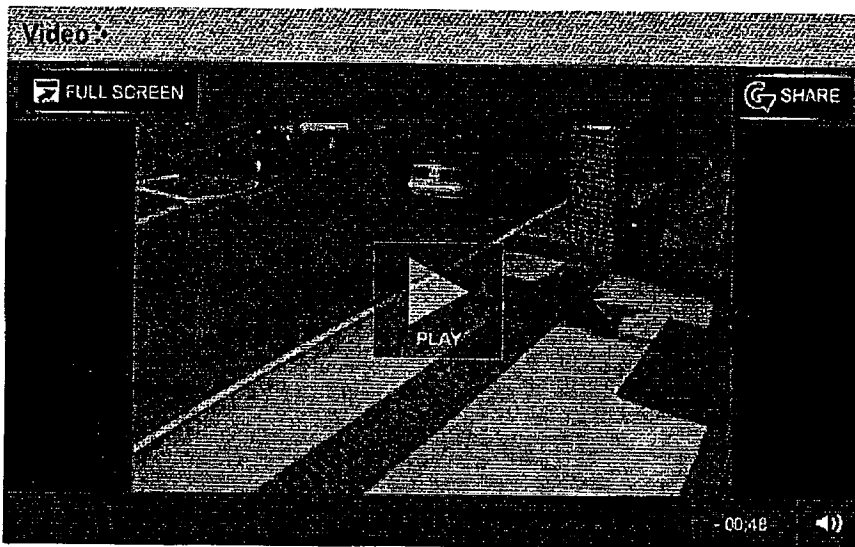

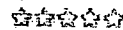

Authorities have released audio from 911 calls reporting an attempted armed robbery at an Internet café in Seminole County that left one of the suspected robbers dead after a shootout with a security guard.

Gary Bryant, 21, was one of two men who walked into the Allied Veterans Internet Café at 3030 East Semoran Boulevard about 1 a.m. Tuesday. He later ended up dead after a gun battle erupted.

Allied Veterans Internet Café is a strip-mall business where patrons can take advantage of a loophole in state law about sweepstakes games and play casino-style games after buying Internet time.

In one of the calls, a woman, breathing heavily, reports to a sheriff's dispatcher that "they've been shooting in here."

"Oh, Lordy," she said. "Oh, Lordy."

Another female caller, who said she was hiding in a bathroom, at first was so panicked that she struggled to

explain the situation, and the operator almost transferred her to medical dispatchers.

"It's a hold-up, it's a hold-up," she later said in hushed tones. "We're in the bathroom. Please!"

Video of the incident shows Bryant and the other man entering the building. They immediately become involved in a conflict with a security guard.

Gunfire erupts, and the security guard fires a round and that strikes Bryant in the back as he heads for the door to exit the business.

Shortly afterward, deputies said the vehicle arrived at a Value Inn on Clarcona-Ocoee Road near U.S. Highway 441, where the two other men inside the vehicle left Bryant's body.

Orange County deputies chased two men in the car, but the men fled in the vehicle — which deputies later determined was stolen — into the Pine Hills area of west Orange and ran away on foot.

The Orange County Sheriff's Office used K-9 units to try to track the two men. No arrests have yet been reported.

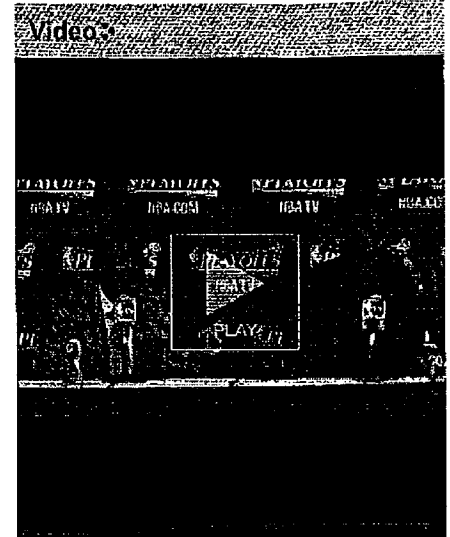
