AN ORDINANCE REGARDING CHAPTER 674 (DISASTER PREPAREDNESS AND CIVIL EMERGENCY); AMENDING PART 7 (DEBRIS REMOVAL FROM PRIVATE STREETS AND OTHER PRIVATE PROPERTY), ORDINANCE CODE, TO PROVIDE FOR TECHNICAL CHANGES TO CHAPTER 674, PART 7, AND TO CREATE A NEW SUBSECTION 674.706(B) (EMERGENCY 11 ROADWAY CLEARANCE), 12 ORDINANCE CODE, REQUIRING PRIVATE COMMUNITIES WITH ENTRANCE GATES TO KEEP THEIR GATES OPEN 13 14 DURING EMERGENCIES; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE 15 DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

Section 1. Amending Part 7 (Debris Removal from Private 18 19 Streets and Other Private Property), Chapter 674 (Disaster Preparedness and Civil Emergency), Ordinance Code. Part 7 (Debris 20 21 Removal from Private Streets and Other Private Property), Chapter 674 (Disaster Preparedness and Civil Emergency), Ordinance Code, is 22 23 hereby amended to read as follows:

24 Chapter 674. Disaster Preparedness and Civil Emergency 25 Part 7. Debris Removal from Private Streets 26 and Other Private Property

Sec. 674.702. Definitions. 28

29 As used in thethis Part, the following terms, phrases and words shall have the following meanings, unless the context clearly 30 otherwise requires: 31

1 Debris meanshall include, but is not limited to, disaster-2 generated displaced, broken or discarded building and construction 3 materials, garbage, vegetative matter and spoiled or ruined household goods or materials. 4

5 Private property means all property that is not owned or 6 controlled by a governmental entity, including private communities 7 as well as the Pprivate streets, means any streetroads, and 8 roadways contained therein that hashave not been dedicated to 9 public use or hashave not been accepted for maintenance by the city 10 or other governmental entity, including streets in gated 11 communities.

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Sec. 674.703. Removal of debris.

13 The city has the authority to enter onto and may remove debris 14 from private streets or other private property when such debris is 15 determined to pose an immediate threat to thelife, public health and, safety, and to the welfare of the community, so that it is in 16 17 the public interest for the city to remove such debris. The Mayor 18 or his or herthe Mayor's designee shall determine whether there is an immediate threat to thelife, public health, safety, and 19 20 community welfare sufficient to warrant removal of said debris on 21 private property in accordance with one or more of the following 22 criteria:

23 (a)There is a significant likelihood that rescue vehicles will be significantly hindered from rendering emergency services to 24 residential and commercial property should the debris be 25 allowed to remain in place absent city removal. 26 (b)The type of debris is such that it may reasonably cause 27 disease, illness, or sickness which that could injure or 28 adversely affect the health, safety, or general welfare of 29 those residing and working in the area if it is allowed to 30 remain. 31

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1 (c)The clearing is necessary to effectuate orderly and expeditious restoration of city-wide utility services 2 including, but not limited to, power, water, sewer, and 3 telephone. 4 (d)The debris is determined by the ChiefDirector of the 5 Municipal Code Compliance DivisionDepartment of Public Works 6 7 or his or herthe Director's designee to require removal to be 8 dangerouseliminate immediate threats or of 9 hazardoussignificant damage to improved public or private 10 property. 11 (e)The debris prevents garbage collection, thereby creating a public health hazard. 12 13 (f) The debris contains contaminants which that have a reasonable likelihood of leeching into the soil and/or aquifer 14 of the citygroundwater. 15 (q) The debris has a substantial negative impact in preventing 16 or adversely affecting emergency repairs to buildings and/or 17 18 property. (h)The debris presents a reasonable danger of being 19 20 transported by wind and/or water into the surrounding areas of 21 the city, and thereby increasing the cost of recovery and 22 removal. (i) If left over time, tThe debris poses a significant 23 likelihood of, if left over time, producing mold which that 24 would be injurious to public health. 25 (j)The presence of the debris significantly adversely impacts 26 the city's recovery efforts. 27 (k)The debris significantly interferes with drainage or water 28 runoff, so as to becreating a significant hazard in the event 29 of significant rainfall. 30 (1) The sheer volume of the debris is such that it is 31 3

impractical and unreasonable to remove <u>it</u> in an orderly and efficient manner <u>absent_without</u> action by the city. (m)The type, extent and nature of the debris are such that it would cause much greater damage if the debris was not removed immediately. (n)The clearing of the debris is necessary to ensure the economic recovery of the affected community to the benefit of

8 the community at large.

9 Sec. 674.704. Waiver; federal reimbursement.

With regard to the eligibility for federal funding, the Federal Emergency Management Agency may waive the requirement for the city to establish the criteria listed in Section 674.703 as a condition precedent to city action depending on the severity of the situation.

15 The city acknowledges that commercial property debris removal 16 is generally ineligible for reimbursement under the Public 17 Assistance Program unless determined to be in the public interest 18 and subject to the other private property provisions as defined in 19 the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) Disaster 20 Assistance Policy for Debris Removal from Private Property, as 21 amended from time to time, and that reimbursement for non-22 commercial private property debris removal is discretionary with 23 FEMA. Sec. 674.705. Indemnification and hold harmless. 24 25 (a)In consideration for and as a condition of removing debris

from private property, the city may require the owner of such private property to indemnify and hold harmless the city, the State of Florida and the United States, and their officers, agents, employees and contractors from any claims arising from removal of debris from private property.

31 (b)As a part of any request for federal funding for debris

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1	removal from private property, the city agrees to indemnify
2	and hold harmless, to the maximum extent permitted by
3	lawextent allowed by section 768.28, Florida Statutes, the
4	United States, its officers, agents, employees and contractors
5	from any claims arising from the city's negligence in the
6	removal of debris from private property. <u>Nothing in this Part</u>
7	7 shall be construed as a waiver of the city's sovereign
8	immunity beyond that allowed by state law and the Florida
9	Constitution.
10	Sec. 674.706. Emergency roadway clearance.
11	(a)Nothing herein shall limit the city, in a first
12	responsewithin the first seventy (70) hours after the
13	declaration of a disaster emergency, from clearing and pushing
14	debris from all streets, both public and private, as necessary
15	to ensure access by necessary for the movement of emergency
16	vehicles, including police, fire, rescue and public utilities.
17	(b)When a hurricane warning is issued or a disaster emergency
18	is declared, all private communities with entrance gates shall
19	open the gates and keep them open until otherwise determined
20	by the Mayor or the Mayor's designee, to allow for access in
21	the case of an emergency.
22	Sec. 674.707. No requirement to remove debris from private
23	property.
24	This partNothing in this Part 7 shall not deemed to require or
25	legally obligatebe construed to require the city to remove debris
26	from private streets or property other private property, the
27	decision to remove except where the severity of the situation is of
28	such <u>magnitude or the debris being within the discretion of the is</u>
29	so widespread that it is determined by the Mayor or the Mayor's
30	designee, in their sole discretion, <u>upon</u> to be a finding that such
31	removal is significant, immediate threat to life, health and

1 safety, the welfare of the city, and in the overriding public interest of the city to remove debris from such areas as set forth 2 3 in section 674.70 this Part 7. Effective Date.
