Title:	A Resolution of the City of Punta Gorda, Florida electing to use the Uniform Method of Collecting Non-Ad Valorem Special Assessments levied within the incorporated area of the City to fund a stormwater utility; stating a need for such levy; providing for the mailing of this Resolution; and providing for an effective date.
Funds:	n/a
Recommended Action:	City Council adoption of the proposed resolution electing to use the uniform method of collecting non-ad valorem special assessments to fund a stormwater utility.
Summary:	Section 197.3632, Florida Statutes, requires that the City hold a public hearing and adopt a resolution of intent to use the uniform method of collection for any assessment program in the calendar year prior to any such collection. The resolution, which does not obligate the City to use the method or impose a special assessment, must be adopted by January 1 and sent to the Charlotte County Tax Collector, the Charlotte County Property Appraiser and the Florida Department of Revenue by January 10.
	The statute also requires that notice of the public hearing to adopt the resolution of intent be published in a newspaper of general circulation once a week for the four consecutive weeks immediately before the date of the hearing.
	This resolution is non-binding and the City may reduce the areas covered by any future assessments or decide not to go forward with the assessment program at a later date. By adopting the attached resolution, the City is simply reserving the right to use the tax bill collection method beginning in November of 2017.
	Attached are the Stormwater Utility Service Delivery Options Memo and Presentation, as well as a list of 408 locations with known drainage problems.
	The list shows street name followed by address so that we could easily sort and search. Each drainage problem may involve several homes but generally we identified the center of the problem. At the time field work is done, the problem area will be surveyed and corrected from the high point to the low point, ensuring that the problem isn't moved from one lot to another.

Once the bids come in, we will be able to approximate how much work can be done in the first year.

# RESOLUTION NO.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF PUNTA GORDA, FLORIDA ELECTING TO USE THE UNIFORM METHOD OF COLLECTING NON-AD VALOREM SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS LEVIED WITHIN THE INCORPORATED AREA OF THE CITY TO FUND A STORMWATER UTILITY; STATING A NEED FOR SUCH LEVY; PROVIDING FOR THE MAILING OF THIS RESOLUTION; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

**WHEREAS**, the City of Punta Gorda, Florida (the "City") is contemplating the imposition of special assessments to fund a stormwater utility for all real property located within the municipal boundaries of the City; and

**WHEREAS**, the City intends to use the uniform method for collecting non-ad valorem special assessments for the cost of providing a stormwater utility service to property within the incorporated area of the City as authorized by Section 197.3632, Florida Statutes, as amended, because this method will allow such special assessments to be collected annually commencing in November 2017 in the same manner as provided for ad valorem taxes; and

**WHEREAS**, the City held a duly advertised public hearing prior to the adoption of this Resolution, proof of publication of such hearing being attached hereto as Exhibit "A".

### NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

1. Commencing with the Fiscal Year beginning on October 1, 2017 and with the tax statement mailed for such Fiscal Year and continuing until discontinued by the City, the City intends to use the uniform method of collection authorized in Section 197.3632, Florida Statutes, as amended, for collecting non-ad valorem assessments for the cost of providing a stormwater utility within the incorporated area of the City. A legal description of such area subject to the assessment is attached hereto as Exhibit "B" and incorporated by reference.

2. The City hereby determines that the levy of the assessments is needed to fund the cost of a stormwater utility within the City of Punta Gorda.

3. Upon adoption, the City Clerk is hereby directed to send a copy of this Resolution by United States mail to the Florida Department of Revenue, the Charlotte County Tax Collector, and the Charlotte County Property Appraiser by January 10, 2017.

4. This Resolution shall be effective upon adoption.

The City of Punta Gorda, Florida (the "City") hereby provides notice, pursuant to Section 197.3632(3)(a), Florida Statutes, of its intent to use the uniform method of collecting non-ad valorem special assessments to be levied within the incorporated area of the City, for the cost of establishing and operating a stormwater utility service to property within the incorporated area of the City commencing with the Fiscal Year beginning on October 1, 2017 and continuing until discontinued by the City. The City will consider the adoption of a resolution electing to use the uniform method of collecting such assessments authorized by Section 197.3632, Florida Statutes, at a public hearing to be held at 9:00 a.m. on December 7, 2016 in the City Hall Council Chambers, 326 West Marion Avenue, Punta Gorda, Florida. Such resolution will state the need for the levy and will contain a legal description of the boundaries of the real property subject to the levy. Copies of the proposed form of resolution, which contain the legal description of the real property subject to the levy, are on file at the City Clerk's Office in City Hall, located at 326 West Marion Avenue, Punta Gorda, Florida. All interested persons are invited to attend. In the event any person decides to appeal any decision by the City with respect to any matter relating to the consideration of the resolution at the above-referenced public hearing, a record of the proceeding may be needed and in such an event, such person may need to ensure that a verbatim record of the public hearing is made, which record includes the testimony and evidence on which the appeal is to be based.

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



Issue: Establishment of annual funding source for stormwater (drainage) management.

**Alternatives:** City Council tentatively approved a \$500,000 allocation from a combination of ad valorem taxes and General Fund reserves to enhance drainage improvements during FY 2017, with the proviso that the allocation continue in future years from a to be determined revenue source. Option 1 continues such funding as part of the General Fund, similar to the funding set aside method for road resurfacing. Option 2 establishes a stormwater utility fee to pay for such services.

**Recommendation:** City Council consider adoption of a stormwater utility fee to pay for drainage management services.

**Discussion:** Many Florida communities have recognized the need to implement a programmatic approach to stormwater management as opposed to a project-by-project approach. The internal strategy of the programmatic approach is to develop a long-term program composed of "building blocks" of comprehensive and cohesive program elements, while at the same time meeting the community's demand for solutions to specific problems through construction of facilities. A reasoned and well-planned approach ensures that continuity is maintained through a developmental process that must necessarily span several years.

In 1981 the City of Tampa was the first Florida community to conduct a detailed assessment of the feasibility of using a stormwater utility for improving service, maintaining their existing system, and funding future capital investments. However, Tampa decided not to adopt a stormwater utility in that year to fund its stormwater management program. In 1986 the City of Tallahassee was the first Florida community to actually develop and implement a stormwater utility. Stormwater utilities have flourished since 1986. Florida has 67 counties and over 410 cities. The Florida Stormwater Association's (FSA) best estimate is that there are now approximately 165 local governments that have established stormwater utilities pursuant to Chapter 403, Florida Statutes, or their own home rule powers.

Florida stormwater utilities commonly focus on several of the following services:

- ✓ Capital Projects for Improved Flood Control
- ✓ Enhanced Maintenance for Improved Flood and Pollution Control
- ✓ Capital Projects for Water Quality Treatment
- ✓ Water Quality Management
- ✓ Capital Facilities that Induce Groundwater Recharge for Water Supply
- ✓ Ecological Preservation
- ✓ Systemwide Planning
- ✓ Regulation and Enforcement Activities
- ✓ MS4 Permit Compliance

Stormwater utilities require a commitment of time and resources to develop and implement, but what are their benefits? This important question can be answered from two different points of view. The first answer is from the perspective of the policy makers and management who are responsible for annual funding of a community's stormwater program:

- ✓ New Funding Source Revenues generated by stormwater utilities can be used as a new source of funds to supplement a community's current stormwater management funding.
- ✓ Supplemental or Replacement Funding Source Stormwater utility revenues can be used to replace current General Fund/ad valorem tax funding which enables the tax based funding to be used for other community needs or to lower the tax rate.
- ✓ Sustainable Revenues Revenues generated by stormwater utilities are constant, tend to gradually increase with the community's growth, and can be gradually adjusted to meet needs.
- ✓ Bondable Revenue Stream Bonds for capital improvements can be issued to facilitate construction of stormwater management facilities, because revenues generated by stormwater utilities can be used to pay back bonds.

The second answer is from the perspective of the technical individuals responsible for daily operations and has three key components:

- ✓ Programmatic Stability A community's stormwater management program will tend to operate on a stable basis which supports staff stability, continued levels of maintenance operations, and continuity in capital improvements programs since stormwater utilities have stable revenues.
- ✓ Long-Term View Stormwater managers are allowed to adopt a longer view in planning for capital investments, undertaking maintenance enhancement, and developing staff since they are not operating in a year-to-year funding environment with no certainty of follow-on funding in successive years.
- ✓ Facilitation of NPDES Compliance Communities that are regulated under the Federal NPDES Stormwater Permitting Program are more readily able to comply with the specific permit conditions requiring the development of funding for annual operation of the Storm Water Management Program that is contained in their MS4 Permits.

In the 2014 FSA survey, the most common methodology used for stormwater revenue generation is establishment of a user fee (75%). Non-ad valorem or special assessment (21%), ad valorem tax (2%) and other (2%) are the other methods identified. The most commonly used stormwater rate methodology is based on the amount of impervious area (88%). The average utility rate is \$5.68 per month.

Based on 2016 data, 75% of Florida municipalities with populations 15,000-20,000 have established a stormwater utility as their means to provide services within their community. The fee shown in the chart below is for a typical single-family home.

Not all properties within Florida communities are charged for stormwater utility services. Only a small percentage do not allow any exemptions. Most utilities grant exemptions and/or credits to certain types of properties based upon their ownership, level of development, quality of runoff, extent of community use and other considerations. The most common exemptions/credits are for streets/highways, undeveloped property, railroad property, agricultural areas, and parks. Some utilities also exempt/credit government properties and those properties related to special districts. The key difference between a stormwater utility fee and use of ad valorem tax is that property owners that do not pay property taxes (religious institutions, homestead values less than \$25,000, disabled military, low income senior, and other exemptions under state statute) are eligible to pay the utility fee imposed on non-exempt properties.

Within the City of Punta Gorda, there are 13,840 parcels (properties) as shown below.

The most common methods for collection of a stormwater utility fee are placement on the property tax bill as a non-ad valorem assessment or added onto the monthly water/sewer bill. Currently, the City's non-ad valorem assessments are for lot mowing and canal maintenance. Future assessments under consideration are for the Burnt Store Isles electric undergrounding study and a future Punta Gorda Isles Bird Section cut through.

The proposed FY 2017 General Fund budget allocates \$500,000 from a combination of property taxes and reserves to enhance drainage improvements. This allocation begins to address the 186 properties that do not meet the 72-hour rule (properties that do not dry up within 72 hours after a storm event). However, this represents a one-time allocation and does not address future years' funding. As shown from the above information, a significant number of municipalities throughout the State have established a portion of General Fund recurring revenues or a separate utility fee to fund ongoing stormwater services.
